In Lower Sixth Form you will study Education, Education in Context, Research Methods and Families and Households.

EDUCATION:


- Relationships and processes within schools particularly, teacher/ pupil relationships and how this influences achievement
- Differential educational achievement by social class, gender and ethnicity
- Functions of the education system and social policies

FAMILIES AND HOUSEHOLDS:

- Changing patterns of marriage, cohabitation, separation, divorce and the diversity of household structures
- Gender roles, domestic labour and power relationships within the family
- The nature of childhood and changes in the status of children
- Child abuse and domestic violence

RESEARCH METHODS:

- Positivism and interpretivism
